SPEECH BY ANNE-MARIE LECLERC, PRESIDENT OF THE WORLD ROAD ASSOCIATION

ON THE OCCASION OF THE CLOSING SESSION OF THE 24TH WORLD ROAD CONGRESS IN MEXICO CITY

Part 1: Current congress and 2012–2015 Strategic Plan

Mr. Secretary of Communications and Transportation, Mr. Organizing Committee Chair, Honourable Council members, Distinguished colleagues, Ladies and gentlemen,

The themes of the 24th World Road Congress were mobility, sustainability and development. That was a strategic and judicious choice. You might have noticed it this week: safe, sustainable mobility focused on the development of societies was at the heart of the discussions.

The Congress was a smashing success and it met the Association's objectives: promoting best practices, fostering exchanges and promoting sustainable mobility to technicians, users and decision makers.

Throughout this Congress, the World Road Association specifically was able to highlight to the world road community its role as a focal point for exchanges on good road safety practices by adopting a declaration supporting the United Nations Decade for Action on Road Safety.

This Congress is the result of four years of work by the technical committees. I am very pleased to point out the quality of the productions and their technical expertise. The World Road Association is proud to be able to benefit from vast knowledge of so many experts.
