


Bob Lanz used a 22-foot aluminum flatboat yesterday to navigate through downtown Oakville, where water reeked of pig feces and diesel fuel.



CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Take a holistic approach: Beyond mobility, transportation also affects livability and economic vitality as well as social and environmental factors
- 2. Harness visionary leadership: Mayoral support and strong leadership within city agencies often serve as driving forces of transformational projects
- 3. Connect policies to best practices: Strive to integrate the policies with their day-to-day practices
- 4. Develop the right tools: Examine the efficacy of current business practices and organizational structure to enable them to achieve their development goals

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 5. Collaborate: The regional nature of federal funding policies and transportation projects require interagency and multijurisdictional collaboration
- 6. Speak the same language: All participating agencies and stakeholders need to share a common language when discussing the future vision for their city
- 7. Know your audience: Understand your audience in order to determine the best approach for implementing change
